





"The artwork was inspired by a photograph by Emmanuelle Keller used with permission. The challenge for me was to capture a sense of drama, as I imagined the fox prowling discreetly, led by his raised paw, in the daily hunt for food.

I painted it on velour paper with Pastel. I chose velour because I felt it was a surface sympathetic to the soft gentle qualities I could see in the fox, although clearly it was also an intrepid hunter.

I very much enjoyed creating the sharp contrast between the red coat of the fox against the severe landscape, by adding the effect of snow in pastel."

"A friend of mine visited the Isle of Mull in November a few years ago, and came back with some amazing images that she gave me permission to use.

I was totally inspired by the landscape colours in the photograph, which reflected the Stag's coat & camouflaged it into the background, so couldn't wait to try a painting.

The original painting is in acrylic, and very autumnal, but I really wanted to find out if the painting would work in a winter landscape, so I went over it in pastel. I was really pleased to see the glow of the original colours still showing through, but with a wintery feel in snow."

3RD PLACE – KAREN COULSON WITH "PUFFINS UNDER THE MISTLETOE"


"Derwent Watercolour pencils and Coloursoft pencils on white mountboard.

This was just a bit of Christmas fun!

I was delivering a Two-Puffin Picture Workshop at Nature in Art, and offered this picture as an alternative to the "sensible" advertised picture.

Masking fluid was applied for the falling snow in the sky. A blue watercolour pencil was used for the sky colour.

Coloursoft pencils were used to complete the Puffins and snowy ground – so it offered quite a few techniques within the picture."



TWASI Visit to Hamerton Zoo – Tuesday 11th July 2023

A few of us visited Hamerton Zoo in Cambridgeshire on a rather cloudy but warm day.

They seem to specialise in Big and small cats, and there were quite a variety, from huge White Tigers to smaller cats such as Serval and Oncilla – this is a rather pretty one about the size of a domestic cat that I hadn't seen before.



All the enclosures are roomy, giving the larger animals plenty of roaming about space.

The tigers are overlooked by several areas with large glass windows, making it easy to watch them as they stride past or dip in their pond – though I have never been lucky enough to see this.



The cheetah in particular have a very large grassland to roam in, in fact it was difficult to see any which were lying down in the grass.



There was also a new enclosure with several Syrian Brown Bears, and a young one was enjoying playing in a large lake.



The collection is varied, and there are plenty of unusual species. There is also more building work going on as the park expands, so it's well worth a visit.

The Sumatran Tiger, Snow Leopard and Lions were far too sleepy to do more than blink at us, and the beautiful Lynx just rolled over – fancy wearing those fur coats in that heat.





The only one with any energy was a young Orang-Utan, making the most of some quite new gymnastic equipment in their enclosure. This was good to see, as the Orang-Utans previously had a rather restricted area.

The Zoo has fluctuated in quality over the years, but currently seems to be improving many of the enclosures, and the animals looked well cared for and with plenty of space and equipment. If only the same could be said for the catering.

The sun had also brought out the public, and the overflow car park was full, but everyone dispersed around the huge parkland, so it wasn't crowded.



New TWASI Member – Terry Aubrey



There is this intense sense of complete relaxation and normality when spending time in the bush. It is something hard to explain but it is a feeling I can't get anywhere else.

My husband and I have travelled to over 20 African Countries, and we like to explore the National Parks and Reserves in each country we travel to.



Our trips are combination of camping and lodges. We have our own Landcruiser camper stored in South Africa for our use. It has everything we need to spend about 10 days anywhere with no facilities. No facilities, often mean, not even water.

It is priceless to wake up in the middle of the night to the sound of a lion roaring and walking through camp, or with young lions playing up and down a tree next to our car or an elephant feeding on a nearby tree.

Worldwide Wildlife Art


I'm a retired Yorkshire-born art teacher, living on the south coast, where as well as running workshops for community art groups and working on commissions, I volunteer for ABUN (Artists and Biologists Unite for Nature). The biologists take incredible photos of the wildlife with which they are working, and through ABUN'S Facebook app the artists receive and work from these photos. We provide the conservation community with original images to promote awareness of critically endangered species. Completed artwork is posted back to the biologists' organisations, to be made into posters to be displayed in local schools, social centres, and mayor's offices in the villages and towns around conservation areas.

The artworks can be in any medium but must be two dimensional. Through the years I have produced work in pencil, coloured pencils, fine liner, soft pastels, watercolour, and acrylics. As the original founders of the group lived and worked in Brazil, many of the species are from the Amazon and surrounding areas.



The Day of the Amazon, coloured pencils. The world's largest tropical forest in Brazil, essential for climate balance, is home to a huge variety of creatures.



World otter day, watercolour pencils and fine liners.

More than 20 countries take part in a global awareness day every year.

Otters are now an endangered species in the UK.



Wild giraffes, watercolour.

Giraffe populations in northern Africa are rapidly declining, with human activity cited as the main cause. Habitat loss and illegal poaching have left giraffes at risk of extinction.



The Spix's macaw, painted in pastel pencils.

This parrot species was declared extinct in the wild,
but has been reintroduced in Brazil through careful breeding programmes.



The Sira curassow birds of Peru (felt pens/fineliners)
They are listed as critically endangered by BirdLife International,
as they are threatened by habitat destruction and are hunted for meat.




Baby rhinos, soft pastels on textured paper.
Baby Rhino Rescue supports African organisations saving baby rhinos orphaned when their mothers were killed by poachers.



Year of the parrot – Brazil. Water-soluble gel pens.

Trapping wild parrots for the pet trade, as well as hunting, habitat loss, and competition from invasive species, has greatly reduced their numbers, with parrots being exploited more than any other group of wild birds.

LAID HEDGES/DORSET COPPICE GROUP

I think I am very privileged to have been born and bred in the Isle of Purbeck – Swanage in fact, South West Dorset. Although the coastline to-day is promoted 100% i.e. the "Jurassic Coast" I have always been interested in its countryside.

As a young boy I would often cycle into nearby Studland and explore the Heathland and look out for the wildlife. But in particular the birds, which have always been my main interest. In later years my countryside pursuits, as well as painting birds of course, introduced me to the Dorset Coppice Group and a friend said how about me joining the Group. This was back in 1995!

One such event involving Hedge Laying, held not too far away from Dorchester, really created a special interest for me. As to watch from start to finish this "Dorset Style" laid hedge was certainly inspiring – perhaps for a painting?

There are many styles of Laid Hedges found across the UK, the Dorset, Midlands and Northern to name but a few. So far I have painted a Dorset and a Northern style Laid Hedge with the added bird or two.

I have also painted a very "Rustic" style. This particular hedge was not completed 100% by the elderly gentleman I knew as he only had limited materials i.e. very little tree growth to work from. You can see from my painting "Rustic/Jay" (Watercolour).

The Dorset Coppice Group is very well supported and has a very strong membership of all age groups. One Member is a competition winner many times over for Hedgelaying and won the National Championship Award a few years ago. He has assisted and advised King Charles regarding the King's laid hedges at Highgrove House and Sandringham where several competitions have taken place. The King is Patron of the National Hedge Laying Society.











It is good to see our Laid Hedges making a comeback – far better than to see a Hedge which has been "attacked" by a flail!

The Pollyanna Pickering Foundation Winter Prize Draw

Wildlife cameraman and TV personality **Hamza Yassin** joined TWASI patron Anna-Louise Pickering, President of **The Pollyanna Pickering Foundation**, to draw the winning ticket in their Winter prize draw.



Hamza is a British wildlife cameraman and presenter, known for his role as Ranger Hamza on the children's television channel Cbeebies and his work on popular shows such Countryfle and Animal Park. However he became known and loved by a much wider audience in 2022 when he lifted the coveted glitter ball trophy as the winner of the twentieth series of the BBC show Strictly Come Dancing!

Hamza was born in Sudan and moved to Northampton at the age of 8 after his parents – both doctors – were invited to work in the UK. At 21, he visited a friend in Ardnamurchan, a peninsula on the west coast of Scotland, in order to photograph stags. He loved it so much he packed his bags and relocated there two weeks later. For the first nine months, he lived out of his car, showering at a local campsite and washing his clothes at the local community centre. He progressed to staying in empty holiday homes while he built his photography business and guided tours, and eventually bought his own home. Ever since he has loved to share his passion for ornithology and wildlife, and was happy to support the Foundation by selecting the winning ticket.

Between the sales of prize draw tickets, donations and a percentage of sales from Pollyanna's Summer exhibition the Foundation has raised £5,000.00 to build a bat rehabilitation unit at the Harper Asprey Wildlife Hospital here in the UK

Guest Artist Jamie Boots

Past TWASI member Jamie Boots has become well known as a graphite artist and has many followers of his beautifully rendered drawings. He teaches regularly at Nature in Art and has held workshops for TWASI over the years inspiring many of our membership.

Jamie is originally from New Zealand moving to the UK in early life and is now based in a quiet village in Wales. He had an interest in art from an early age, but this wouldn't develop until much later in life with a passion for art and wildlife going hand in hand. Different mediums were tried but graphite pencil was the most natural choice allowing the ability to capture mood and character in fine detail.

Jamie is self-taught and has learnt a lot over the years through experimentation of how graphite can be manipulated to create different effects and textures. His work has been exhibited widely in galleries and exhibitions as well as a wide number of pictures being published as limited-edition prints. With an interest in his work and the techniques used Jamie regularly runs workshops as well as online tutorials.

In 2021 Jamie started a YouTube channel to show the process that goes into creating a picture as well as reviewing various products and materials.
